



TEN BOOKS To Learn About the Alphabet




“Eating the Alphabet”

Ehlert’s bright illustrations accompany this alphabet of fruits and vegetables. For each letter there are common, and some not-so-common, foods that we eat.




“Alligators All Around

Alligators are all around and Maurice Sendak explains all of the silly things they do in correspondence to the alphabet. This pocket-sized alphabet book will delight.




“Alphabet City”


“Tomorrow’s Alphabet”

Each letter of the alphabet represents not the thing mentioned first, but what it will become tomorrow. This would be a great way to talk about growth along with the ABCs.




“The Dinosaur Alphabet Book”

Each letter matches up with a dinosaur which is then described scientifically. Great for any dinosaur lover. Try Pallotta’s other alphabet books as well!




“Amazing Animals”

A colorfully illustrated animal is depicted for each letter of the alphabet. There are even facts about all of the creatures in a glossary.




“The Graphic Alphabet”

This book of graphic designs by David Pelletier is another alphabet book in which the letters are not found in the image at a glance. Look close!




“Alphabet Adventure”
